DOWNTOWN APARTMENT FIRE



On August 21, WFD was called to Booker T. Washington Apts. on Main Street for a report of smoke inside the building.

Shortly after arrival, firefighters located a fire inside a 4th floor apartment.

One person was taken to the hospital for treatment. Other occupants were either evacuated or advised to shelter in place. The fire was quickly extinguished and isolated to one apartment.

ELM GROVE HOUSE FIRE

B Platoon firefighters were called to Columbia Avenue in Elm Grove on July 11. Smoke was reported coming from the basement of a home.

The crews were able to get the fire under control and prevent it from spreading throughout the house. Fortunately, no one was injured; and the house sustained only minor damage.

Responding units include Engine Co. 2, 5, 10, and 11. Rescue 1, Ladder 1, Squad 1 and Squad 2.



TRAINING REPORT

In late July, our three platoons received special training on a new Zoll Autopulse NXT that will be used for patients experiencing cardiac arrest.

The main function of the device is the automated CPR it can perform.

Automated CPR is known to be more efficient than traditional CPR.

ROPES COURSE

To maintain a state of readiness, WFD personnel train throughout the year on a wide range of rescue scenarios.

WFD again teamed up with Crash Course Village from Dayton, Ohio for a rope technician course in August.

Hands-on training units covered life safety knots, repelling solo/with a partner, and haul and lowering systems.

The course highlight was a highline rope rescue over Big Wheeling Creek in Elm Grove.



DOWNTOWN CRASH

Seven vehicles sustained damage in a multi-vehicle crash on September 11. The accident occurred on Main Street in downtown when people were gathering for the memorial ceremony at Heritage Port.

Multiple units responded to the chaotic scene. Fortunately, no pedestrians were injured.



Both drivers were transported to the hospital for evaluation for injuries. Main Street was shut down for several hours to allow investigators to perform their work.

Happy Retirement! Assistant Chief Paul Harto wrapped up his 38-year career with the City of Wheeling on August 24.
